



Prof. Sang-Myon Rhee (SJD, Harvard) has taught at Seoul National University (SNU) since 1982. He also taught at the National Chengchi University in 2009-2010 and at University of Washington in 1999-2000. His teaching and research areas include public international law, jurisprudence, and laws of terrestrial, hydraulic and celestial spaces. Before joining SNU, he worked briefly with the Korean Foreign Ministry as junior officer, and with Harvard Law School as research fellow. He also worked with Chadbourn Park in New York City and intermittently with the Legal Advisor's Office at the U.S. State Department.

He has written numerous articles at home and abroad including articles dealing with sea boundaries that have appeared in the *American Journal of International Law* and *Harvard International Law Journal*. His legal opinions have been influential at home and abroad, cited in the pleadings at the International Court of Justice, dealing with the US/Canada Gulf of Maine case in 1982-85, with which he was involved as a member of the U.S. litigation team. He served as Chairman of International River Committee (ICOLD) in 1988-1997 and as Co-Chair of the Group of Teaching International Law at the American Society of International Law in 2008-2011.

He was President of the Korean Society of International Law in 2004-05. He was one of the founding members of the Korean Energy Law Institute, and Korean Society of Air and Space Law in 1987. Currently he serves as President of the Korean Branch of International Law Association. He has been editors of several international law journals, such as *Asia Pacific Journal of Law and Human Rights*. He has also been on the Board of Honorary Editors of *Asian Journal of International Law*, *Chinese Journal of International Law*, among others. He has often sat on the bench at the Quarter & Semi-Final International Rounds at the Jessup International Law Moot Court Competition in Washington, D.C. He has also sat on the bench at the Semi-Final International Round of the Space Law Moot Court at the 2009 IAC in Daejeon, Korea.
